Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ Jesus,

In the church year, since the Festival of Pentecost (remember that!?), we have been in "ordinary time." "The English name 'Ordinary time' translates the Latin term *tempus per annum* -literally 'time through the year'" (see Wikipedia). With the start of a new church year in Advent the pace of change picks up.

The four week season of Advent focuses on the first coming of the Messiah and also highlights the hope that "Christ will come again." The twelve days of Christmas celebrate the Incarnation. And in Epiphany we affirm who Jesus the Messiah is and also renew our commitment to be evangelists- to share the good news of God in Christ Jesus. These seasons are meant to help us serve God with joy and with all our mind, bodies and strength.

The new church year brings changes. And where the calendar year is concerned, as we move into 2014, we will see significant changes at Grace and Holy Trinity Church as well. We are completing a very successful capital campaign. I am grateful to everyone who worked on this, beginning with Marshall and Caroline Morton and ending with every person who made a gift or pledge. Construction should begin in the Spring and continue over the Summer. I am so grateful to and excited for this congregation. We will keep you posted as things continue to move forward.

Also important, and for whom I am profoundly grateful, are all the people who made a pledge to support the annual mission of Grace and Holy Trinity Church. These pledges represent our faith in Christ Jesus. We are hoping that through sacrificial giving we can increase the over-all budget by 4%. This is where we need to be to fully answer what we believe is God's call to us. I am writing this on Halloween, and I hope by the time this is in the mail, we will have made our goal.

Blessings and peace to you. I wish you a meaningful Advent, a joyous Christmas and an Epiphany full of good news!


***At Grace & Holy Trinity Church

Grace & Holy Trinity Church has been serving children and families in need during the holidays for more than two decades. What started out as part of the Social Services Ministry, evolved into what we know today as the Christmas Ministry. For many years and as a result of your generosity, 75 school-aged children have received basic necessities like new clothing and a small toy during the holidays.

This ministry continues to evolve. In 2013 we are working with several new organizations – Dumbarton Elementary School, St. Andrew’s School and Peter Paul Development Center. These organizations have identified children, 12 and under, who are in need of assistance. Many are from the same family.

How can you help?

Adopt a family

Vestry Elections

The Vestry is the governing board of the parish. They are elected members of the parish. Elections are held yearly at our Annual Meeting. If you or someone you know would like to be considered for nomination to the Vestry you are encouraged to contact Suzanne Williams, our Senior Warden. Terms are for three years. In order to be considered you must be at least 16 years of age and have your baptism and confirmation or reception registered on the books of this parish. Also, candidates should be members in good standing, meaning that unless for good cause prevented, they have been faithful in the corporate worship of the church and in working, praying and giving for the spread of the kingdom of God. It is the expectation of Grace and Holy Trinity Church that all Vestry members make a financial pledge to the GHTC operating budget. The nominating committee, consisting of the Senior Warden and other members of the Class of 2014, will present at the congregational meeting on February 2, 2014.






Mid-week Groups

The need we encounter every day is overwhelming. Whether we are confronted by those who panhandle and hold signs on street corners, or the sight of the poor sleeping in parks and alleyways and in transitional or transient housing, the need is greater than we are able to adequately answer. At GHTC, we try hard to be as responsive and generous as is possible, and still we know that we can't help everyone. When faced with this inadequacy, the Christian turns to God for solace and strength, mercy and hope. So please, pray for the poor and those whom it would be easy to forget and for those

who work to relieve the suffering of those less fortunate than we. Pray for the grace and courage to sacrifice some of the comfort that you enjoy for the relief of others.

CARITAS (Congregations Around Richmond Involved To Assure Shelter) serves as the first line of community support for anyone in need of emergency shelter. Over 185 participating congregations provide shelter, food, and necessities on a weekly basis to individuals and families in need of immediate assistance. It is the largest and most inclusive shelter in Richmond. CARITAS fills an alarming gap in the shelter system by reaching segments of the population ineligible for any other program: adults facing addictions, families with fathers, large families, and families with adolescent sons. It provides the support, training, and material assistance necessary to break the cycle of homelessness and restore stable, productive lives.



For many years at GHTC, we have provided hospitality daily for at least 8 weeks, serving as an intake site where clients check-in and are met by transportation to their shelter sites. The work of volunteers in this ministry is simple: make coffee, put out refreshments, visit with clients, and help clean up afterwards. This is an easy opportunity to commit to regular service of the most vulnerable in our community.

This year, we are doubling our commitment to 16 weeks of service. We began on Saturday, October 19 and will continue through Friday, February 21. The hours will be from about 4:30 p.m. until 6:30 p.m. For more information or to volunteer, please contact The Rev. Michael Cadaret.



Holiday Soup Kitchen Opportunities

Soup Kitchen will be open on through the holidays: Friday, November 29, December 20 and 27. These are great opportunities to add an experience of service to the poor to your celebration of the holidays, and great opportunities for middle school and high school students to get community service hours. We serve from 1:00-1:45. Some people get to church about 10:00 a.m. to cook and set-up. Others come around 12:30 to serve and clean-up. Normally everyone (the cooks and servers) gather around noon to eat lunch together.

Cooking for Jesus:

Cooking for Jesus is a program where Grace and Holy Trinity Parishioners cook Sunday night dinner for the Campus Ministry Students. Dinner is served at 6pm on Sundays, and Grace and Holy Trinity can reimburse you for your grocery costs.



Thank you to everyone who has already signed up for Cooking For Jesus this fall. The campus ministry students love your home-cooked dinners on Sunday nights and really appreciate your time, energy, and of course, great food!

GHTC VCU Food Pantry needs you! Looking for a way to give back to the local community? We are looking for volunteers who would be able to assist in sorting and distributing food during operation hours. Food donations are constantly needed and greatly appreciated. Donations for the needy

As the year comes to a close, many assistance agencies have exhausted their funds for the year, and yet requests for assistance continue to climb. Please consider these simple donations to help the staff of GHTC respond.

Clothes and Personal Hygiene Items

When available, we put out donated clothes and hygiene items for our guests who come to Soup Kitchen. Please only donate items that are still serviceable, and we much prefer that donated socks and undergarments be new. Traveler size soap, shampoo, toothbrushes, toothpaste, lotion, and feminine hygiene products are always in demand.



Empty Jars, Plastic Bottles, and Plastic Grocery Bags

At Soup Kitchen, we put together "to go bags" which contain jars of soup, cornbread, and iced tea, and we need you spare bottles and bags and jars to do it. So don't throw those things in the recycle bin, bring them to us.



Non Perishable Food

We are always collecting non-perishable food. Please find the collection bin in the back hallway, just outside the choir room. Often recipients of assistance will "browse" what we have on hand, but most often we pass what we have collected on to the Central Virginia Food Bank. The Central Virginia Food Bank (CVFB) serves 31 counties and 5 cities, but approximately half of those agencies are located in the Richmond Metro area. Recipients of CVFB food and programs include, but are not limited to children, the elderly, the disabled, the newly unemployed, the mentally challenged, the homeless, the working poor, battered women, victims of natural disasters, and single-parent families. Of critical importance to the CVFB is stopping childhood hunger. Poverty and food insecurity negatively influence the diet and health of many low-income children. Telling time and learning to wait

There are many ways to tell time. We use clocks and calendars, for example. We might mark time by our birthdays or when school begins and ends. A day has 24 hours, a week has 7 days, and a year has 365 days. If we think of these conceptually, we generally see them on a line. January is at the beginning; December is at the end.

But the Church tells time differently. The Church's year is Christological. As the Rev. Jerome Berryman explains in his book *Young Children and Worship*, the Church "tells time by celebrating the events of Jesus' birth, life, death, resurrection, and ascension and the gift of the Holy Spirit." These are divided into two cycles. A key word here is cycle—it denotes a circular movement, not a linear one. The two cycles—Christmas and Easter—are divided further into our six Church seasons: Advent, Christmas, Epiphany, Lent, Easter, and Pentecost.

We begin the season of Advent on December 1 this year. The first Sunday of Advent is also the first Sunday of a new church year. It marks the end of the old Church year and the beginning of the new. The word advent comes from a Latin word meaning "coming" or "arrival." In Advent we are waiting for the coming of the birth of Christ. In our own lives, Advent can be a special time of learning to wait and slow down.

Margaret Wheatley in an article, *"Servant Leadership and Community Leadership in the 21st Century"*, writes that one of the crises of our age is the belief that we can ignore or negotiate with time. This mis-guided belief, she says causes us to forget about the natural rhythms and cycles of life. "Instead we believe that it's a straight trajectory into the future, and we can go as fast as we please. This can move us away from nature, from rhythm, from others, from God and even from a sense of place. Wheatley adds that as people in the Christian tradition, and especially for those of us in liturgical churches, it is time to say ENOUGH! We must take time to think. We must take time to reflect. We must take time to slow down and enjoy the cycles of nature and our own lives. Advent is a season for helping us do just this.

Advent can teach us to wait. How do you learn to wait? Our culture is not a particularly adept teacher at this. It seems to teach us to hurry, be impatient, and want instant gratification. Some of the traditions of Advent such as the Advent calendar and Advent wreath are about the opposite – about slowing down and learning to wait. How might you use them this Advent? As we await the birth of Christ what might we be waiting to be born in our own lives?

Advent is a gift of time if we will only grasp it. It is a time to move more slowly, spend more time with family, friends, and with God. Where is Christ trying to break into your life but you are too busy and anxious to notice?
